Responsible Business Conduct

Fall Semester 2023

The module Responsible Business Conduct is part of the Master of Law UZH and consists of the course with the same name. The course takes place weekly every Wednesday from 10:15 to 12:00 in room RAI-J-031, starting 20 September 2023.

Course description

The course will focus on the existing and emerging rules on responsible business conduct. After an introduction covering the basic instruments in the field of responsible business conduct, including the OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises on Responsible Business Conduct, we will discuss the interactions of business with society in various fields, including human rights and climate change, as well as how to conduct business responsibly through risk-based due diligence. Students will learn what responsible business conduct entails.

The course will be held in seminar style. Students are expected to participate actively in the discussions and to give presentations.
