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Prof. Lavanya Rajamani

Lavanya Rajamani is a Professor of International Environmental Law at the Faculty of Law of the University of Oxford and Yamani Fellow in Public International Law at St Peter's College, Oxford. She writes, teaches and advises on international environmental law, in particular international climate change law and policy. Prof. Rajamani serves as a Coordinating Lead Author for the IPCC. She has also participated extensively in international climate negotiations, formed part of the UNFCCC core drafting and advisory team at the 2015 Paris negotiations, and provides her expertise to current and prospective climate litigants before national and international courts.
